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We had a visit from our State Representative, Emily Dievendorf on Friday 2/23/24. This was our representative's first visit to Charter House. Historically, Charter House has had a great relationship with our State Representative, with the last two being Senator Sarah Anthony and Mayor Andy Schor. This was a great opportunity to showcase our location, all the great services we provide, and the wonderful members that come to Charter House. After taking a tour of Charter House's building and getting a brief overview of what Clubhouse is, Rep. Deivendorf ate lunch with us. While enjoying a great meal prepared in our kitchen, members took the opportunity to get to know our Representative. It turns out that Rep. Deivendorf lives in the area and we are a short walk from both her home and her office. Rep. Deivendorf shared with us that she doesn't drive because she has epilepsy and walks everywhere. She said that now that she knows us and where we are

for lunch and spend time with us more often. One of the topics that came up during lunch had to do with housing problems in Lansing. Two of our members shared that they are currently homeless and spoke of their frustration with all the requirements and cost of getting into an apartment. Rep. Deivendorf said that she is on a committee that is trying to address housing issues in Lansing and gave the members her office's contact information so they can see if her office can help them with finding housing at all. We talked about how the Clubhouse model has a standard that talks about how Clubhouses have services to assist members with housing issues. As Charter House does not have any apartments, we utilize the housing services

tions for apartments and follow up with apartment management. I floated the idea of the committee addressing housing issues that Rep. Deivendorf is on assisting CEI CMHA renovating properties that it owns and converting them into apartments. An example would be to renovate Richard's Place, which is located right next to Charter House Clubhouse, into 4 one bedroom/efficiency apartments specifically for Charter House members. Rep. Deivendorf said that it would difficult to do during this fiscal year, but it is something that we could revisit for the next fiscal year. Perhaps down the road, Charter House will have apartments for its members.

Overall, it was a great visit where we strengthened our relationship with our Representative. We look forward to future visits and the ability to advocate for Charter House and its members.

Erika is the newest member on the crew. Erika started on 2/5 and after a couple weeks on the job she described that its been a great experience and is learning the tricks of the trade. Consumer Advisory Council

Are you looking to give your input into CMH and its services? Well there is a great opportunity to get involved with a consumer advisory council. Once a month this group meets to get input on advice from its consumers on how to improve CMH's services. If you are willing to lend your voice and voices of others in a constructive manner you might be the one to get involved. This council meets

every 1st Thursday of the month from 3:30-5pm via zoom or phone in. Having access to the internet or a phone will be a requirement. This position requires a 2 year commitment per term and can stay on for 3 terms (6 years) after which you'll need to take a year break then can reapply. Being part of the consumer advisory council also pays \$75. At this time there are 3 spots opened if you are interested you can ask George. It's a

great way to be an advocate for your self and friends.

Resources: MEAP and Northwest Initiative Free tax service.

Michigan energy assistance program (MEAP) helps people who are struggling to pay for their utilities. One important tip MEAP provides is if you know you'll fall behind in payments call your utility company early to let them know, they may be able to work on a payment plan that works for you. If you need help making

payments MEAP can connect you to provide supplemental payments and self sufficiency services to low income residence. MEAP grantees are all community partners with MDHHS and can help applicants to navigate the MDHHS application process.

Northwest Initiative through AARP is offering free tax prepa-

ration. To make an appointment call 517-999-2894. This service is available to all low to moderate income individuals and families ages 50 and older.

Closing the Digital Gap offers low cost to free laptops and computers as well as enrolling individuals into a low cost internet for \$10/month. In addition to the resources

listed they offer computer repair services which can be discounted if you have attended one of their computer training classes. There are training courses to help sharpen those computer skills varying from beginner to advance. These classes are either free or low costs and will need to speak with them directly to figure out if you meet their criteria for free classes. This opportunity is by appointment only at this time and can contact

I like to be weird, the one who stands out impacting a crowd. For five days I dressed like Lansing Police Department, FBI, Ingham County Sheriff's Office, United States Marshals Service, and Michigan State Police in the midst of my public safety heroes.

The most compelling moment was sharing my trauma with a Lansing Fire Department public servant. I told him how I support the police but I'm' offish towards paramedics. He came over and sat by me in the back of the classroom.

I became entirely tense. I had trouble looking at him. He wanted to hear my story. I walked to the hallway and bawled my eyes out like I'm crying now as I write you. I went back to my seat, but lost control again racing to the bathroom.

He invited me to sit up front with him. I joined him for the rest of the Tri-County CIT. We are all here to better learn to accommodate mental illness in emergencies. Everything slowed down for 40 hours of training. Some moments seemed accelerated and urgent as they were real life scenarios.

Breathe... Slow it down: "Distance + Time= Precision." This is about deescalation.

Every person in the room was involved in first-response this first day except a NAMI Lansing volunteer setting the scene with background details and the presenters. Love and rawness in the room. I have told you that I am a MoP—A member of the public. A conscientious citizen backing the blue. This past week "MoP" took on a new meaning in the midst of heroes: Mental Operative. Police go into street situations undercover to catch the bad guys totally immersed in a world different than them.

I went into this amazing world of first-responders as a mental health consumer blending in—clean cut, black shoes and black pants (tan tactical pants on FBI Tuesday). A different law enforcement polo every day with my best level of integrity represented, intermixing with a culture I so admire.

An "Undercover" consumer, but telling my story and connecting too with experts in the field of diverse accommodation. The stuff dreams are made of.

When I received my CIT pin and certificate once again I bawled my eyes out. I am honored to be a Charter House Clubhouse Member fully present at the incredible training!

My name is Evelyn. I grew up in Portland, MI, on our family farm. I was the fourth youngest in my family of 10 siblings. I work on the combine bailing wheat and oats. I also learned how to work hard on the farm. I struggled in school, but enjoyed life on the farm and hanging out with my best friend Connie. My sisters are very special to me Pat, Rita, and Marlyn.

I have participated in community mental health programs since I was around 30 years old. During my life I struggled

with depression and learning disabilities. I also have had many falls because of balance issues. I've had a lot of injuries, surgery, and have had to deal with pain.

Work has always helped me to keep going. Attending church regularly was also helpful. My close friendships with Connie and Marie have brought me a lot of joy.

I first came to Charter House when I was 79 years old. I have been a member for about a year. I love it here. Being able to work here has been tremendous. It has helped my physical health and helped me keep my mind and body

strong. Without work, I may have ended up being in a wheel-chair. I appreciate the staff here very much. I feel at home when I'm at Charter House. I am content with my life. I enjoy my home and my new second home.

2024 solar eclipse

On April 8th many parts of the US will be able to view a total solar eclipse. Unfotunately here in Michigan we will not be in the path of a total solar eclipse coming up from Texas and making its way North East towards Maine (see below). With a total solar eclipse the moon is positioned were it's the same exact size in the sky as the sun and perfectly covers the sun. When this happens an observer will be able to wit-

ness its corona which is the suns outer most part of its atmosphere (right). During March Abrams Planetarium will be offering a public show on total solar eclipses called Totality it will run every Fri/Sat at 8pm and Sundays at 4pm. This public show is free with Museums For All (with valid EBT, medicaid, or WIC card and photo ID). Over 1200 museums across the country participate in museums for all. This discounted or free price



can also be applied up to 4 other people per card. This is a great way to learn more about eclipses or other museums in Michigan who participate in museums for all. The next eclipse won't happen in the US for another couple decades.



5 Eclipse Facts:

- Solar eclipses happen during new moons but not every new moon. Due to the moons orbit it is tilted 5 degrees which makes eclipses less often.
- Depending on where you view the solar eclipse the maximum
- length it lasts is 4 mins 28 seconds for 2024. There are situation that it can last for 7 mins 32 sec which are rare. In June of 1973 it reached 7 mins 4 seconds.
- The sun is 400x larger than the moon but
- also 400x farther away which allows us to have solar eclipses.
- 4. Nature will notice as the eclipse happens. Birds will begin to roost as it gets dark and a temperature drop of 10 to 15 degrees will happen.
- Crickets will begin to chirp and other nocturnal insect will make themselves known.
- 5. You'll be able to see the stars on the backdrop of a normally daytime sky.
